Autopsy of a Deceased Church

"The Great Commission Becomes the Great Omission"

Dying churches often sit back and let the pastor or elders visit in the community or with members no longer attending. Where do we stand on this? Are we (or am I) contacting people about worship at Hebron?

Some of our best ideas have come at times when we had no pastor. Worshipping on the lawn during COVID was brilliant and an example for other churches with the Shenandoah Presbytery. We picked up new members who saw us together. Cooperative spirit and initiative was shown by all.

"The Preference Driven Church"

Many church goers or 'not goers' use the excuse that they don't like the hour of the service, or the music, or the pastor. These are just that—excuses. "We are to be servants. We are to be obedient. We are to put others first. We are to do whatever it takes to seek the best for others and the church." Decisions are by the majority, either in full or through the elected elders. They are not designed to match each one's personal preferences. So what if we do not like the way some things are done?

"Pastoral Tenure Decreases"

In a dying church, pastor turnover is rapid. The congregation awaits a new pastor who will make things better. But if the people are unwilling to make the changes recommended by the new pastor, the "honeymoon" phase is over and people start to notice that the new pastor is not perfect and look for reasons to complain. Whatever happened to Christian forgiveness, or any kind of forgiveness?

Ask yourself: Is it personal to me and my family? Did the new pastor not meet <u>my</u> personal expectations? Did he not come running when I called? Soon the new pastor becomes frustrated at the reluctance to change the old ways. So, the church is stuck in the past and discontent begins again.

Few people like change. But how does a church get out of the 'same ole' to try new things and adapt to the 21st Century, which is one fourth gone already? Do we need exactly one wreath on each door? Does the pulpit need to be covered in poinsettias or lilies? Could those donations be used to reach out to the community?

The point of the book, *Autopsy of a Dying Church* is that we must maintain our best energy and drive the church forward. Even though we have contributed our time, talents, and money all these years, we cannot stop now. Our work in God's name is not finished.

SACRA and Valley Mission News

The PW Annual Food Drive Returns For 2024

We are living in tough times. The price of everything has escalated—food, gas, insurance, housing, utilities. And the Hebron membership has felt the pinch. However, the Presbyterian Women made a decision at a recent meeting to try their best to collect food to distribute to families in need in our community. In 2023 with the help of the congregation, the women packed thirty-seven boxes and bags for eleven families that fed fifty-eight people in the Reverse Advent Food Box initiative. This year could be a real challenge, but the ladies felt the project is worth a try so please consider donating to the cause. Please be reminded that expiration dates should be 2025 or beyond on all food items. Millie Ruleman will be collecting monetary donations as well if you feel you are unable to do the shopping for the project. Last year, Millie did a great job watching local grocery ads and shopping at discount grocers.

In addition to the food drive, Larry Mayer is donating a bowl he has turned from oak trees cut on Hebron's property. In the past, Maxine Carpenter has donated quilts she constructed to use to raise additional funds for the PW. Maxine has agreed to collect \$5 donations for a chance to win Larry's hand-turned bowl. The Rev. Frank Hunter Wyche

For almost three years the Rev. William Everhart served as an interim pastor to Hebron after the resignation of Rev. John Barbour in June, 2004. Finally, a Pastor Nominating Committee formed in 2006 and the hunt for a new pastor to serve the congregation began. After reviewing 350 Pastor Information Forms, the PNC believed they had found a candidate who was a strong worship leader, teacher administrator, and valued visitation of the church membership, The PNC then introduced the Rev. Frank Hunter Wyche for consideration. The Committee on Ministry examined Rev. Wyche on March 8, 2007, and he preached his first sermon to the Hebron congregation on May 6, 2007, with a welcoming luncheon following.

Rev. Wyche was born November 10, 1955, the son of Dr. Joseph T. and Elizabeth Calder Wyche. He earned an undergraduate degree in journalism from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. For



twelve years, he was a newspaper editor-reporter-photographer for a bi-weekly newspaper. He also served eight years as a community relations-community education liai-

son with a public school system. He was commissioned as a lay preacher in the Presbytery of Coastal Carolina, preaching up to thirty weeks a year. He graduated from Union Theological Seminary in May, 1998, with a Master of Divinity degree and thus began his second career as a Presbyterian minister.

The Presbytery of Cincinnati ordained him a minister of the PCUSA in July, 1998. He was called as the pastor of the Sharonville Presbyterian Church for more than three years and was designate pastor of White Oak Presbyterian Church for four years. He served as an interim pastor of Reading Lockland Presbyterian church, the vice-moderator of the Presbytery of Cincinnati, and the moderator of the Committee on Ministries. He considered preaching,

teaching, leadership, and pastoral care his strengths.

Frank married his high school "sweetheart" Elaine Britt, a life long educator. They are the parents of four children, Bob, Beth, Brittany, and Andrew and seven grandchildren.

Among the highlights of Rev. Wyche's tenure during his Hebron years, the church hosted the Shenandoah Presbytery in 2008, the Session agreed to sell the Robert E. Lee letter, and the cemetery received a grant from the Virginia Society of the Sons of the American Revolution as a result of six Revolutionary War soldiers who were

buried in the old cemetery.

New board fencing, metal fencing, and numerous tree removals improved Hebron's historic cemeteries. Electrical and heating upgrades in the sanctuary and educational building as well as lighting the back parking lot were completed. The kitchen received a makeover with new flooring, stainless steel islands, and a new ice maker. Events such as fire pit concerts and picnics, Family Fun Nights, and TOY meals enhanced fellowship among the members. A new piano was purchased for the sanctuary and an 8 foot organ stop was added to *Opus 46*.

The congregation made decisions to reduce the size of the Session from fifteen to twelve members as well as to dissolve the Scout troop that had been in existence since 1955. Church membership fell from 243 to 137 and average attendance decreased from 121 to 64.

In December, 2018, Rev. Wyche asked the congregation to dissolve


his relationship with Hebron in order to accept a call to the Sparta Presbyterian church in Sparta,


Moreover, the Session recognizes that Hannah conducted these duties pro bono for a majority of the vears she served.

The meeting was called to order at 12:35pm. A quorum was declared present. The moderator opened the meeting with a devotional reading from Psalm 117 and prayer.

Clerk's Report:

- The Session approved the agenda for this meeting.
- Session approved the minutes from the Stated Session Meeting July 21, 2024, the Email poll August 6, 2024, by common consent.

Communion was served August 4, 2024.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Hannah Bush previously emailed members a Balance Sheet and a Budget vs. Actual income-expense report. Net income as of August 15, 2024, is -870.80. After reviewing the reports, the treasurer's reports were accepted as presented.

<u>Presbytery Meeting:</u> Next meeting scheduled on September 14, 2024, 9:30am, at Massanetta Springs Conference Center in Harrisonburg, VA.

Old Business:

- Officer Nominating Committee Chair Liz Brown brought forth three names to be nominated for the Class of 2027, Glenn Mader, Randy Moyer, and David Obenschain. There was discussion on the difficulty of getting members for the Session. A motion was made to decrease the number of Session members from 12 to 9. The motion was seconded and approved by Session unanimously.
- Larry Mayer gave an update on the incorporation progress. He said the last changes had been made to

the paperwork and we are waiting for the attorney to file.

 Larry is also looking into updates that may need to be made to the insurance policy with the new organist teaching a class in the Fellowship Hall.

Committee Reports:

- Administrative Committee: Ellen Desper and Sandy Showalter asked committee chairs to review the manual on committees and update duties if needed. Committee chairs can email Joann in the church office for a copy.
- Christian Outreach Committee: Chair Randy Moyer presented Tara Cahill her scholarship checks during worship service on July 28, 2024.
- Congregational Life Committee: No report.
- **Property**: Chair Robert Christian reported installation of the air conditioning came in under budget. Budget was \$28,000 plus \$2000-\$3000 for electrical expenses. The cost was approximately \$28,600. The second phase is on hold for the time being due to the first phase working very efficiently. The month of July showed approximately only a \$44 increase on the electricity bill, and \$64 increase for the month of August.
- Worship: Mark Wilson will cover for Rev.
 Scoggins on the Sunday in September while he is on vacation.

Moderator's Report:

• There was discussion on approving groups to use the church facilities. If it is a known group, it can be approved by the property committee, or the clerk and Pastor. Then it will be relayed to the Session members. A motion was made to require new outside community groups to request the use of the building and/or facilities and grounds, at least 30 days prior to an event. The motion was seconded and there was no more discussion. The motion was passed unanimously.

Session passed unanimously a resolution to recognize Hannah Bush for her 23 years of service as choir director. The resolution reads as follows:


